The Lancers go marching on! Although, Bishop Gallagher closed its doors in in 2001, the Bishop Gallagher Football Alumni (BGFA) is keeping the memory and spirit alive.

The BGFA hosted its 5th Annual Gathering and inducted its' 4th Lancers Forever Hall of Fame class this past summer at the Encore Catering & Banquet Center in St. Clair Shores. This year athletes from all sports were invited to attend the event. Former baseball, basketball, cheerleading, swimming and bowling athletes were among the nearly 200 that attended the event. The following were all inducted into the Lancers Forever HOF as athletes; Ivan Bennette ('93), Frank Czapski ('93), Brian Neil ('85), Tajuan Tait ('96) and Leroy Watson ('87).

It was a wonderful night in which alums were able to catch up with each other and reminisce about their playing days. The event also honors the memory of the late, great George Sahadi, who coached the Lancers from 1973 until the final year of the school in '01. George made an impact on countless Gallagher graduates on and off the field over the years. The BGFA awards an annual scholarship in his honor called the "George Sahadi Memorial Scholarship." It was formed in order to provide tuition assistance for family members of former BG players that wish to further their education and athletic careers at a Catholic or Christian school.

The 2019 recipients of the scholarship were Dan Triglia of Warren De La Salle, Dylan Craven of Macomb Lutheran North and Nick Johnson of Detroit U-D Jesuit.

Memories

For many of us, our time at BG shaped a lot of who we became. Through the years several former players expressed what their experiences meant to them. From time to time, we'll share these with you as many of us feel the same way and may not have expressed it in writing. If you have a memory you'd like to share, send it to us.

The Last Season by Pete Kotula (circa 1980)

While the late autumn night grew increasingly colder, the crowds of football fans were leaving the seasons last football game. A lone player in blue remained upon the now deserted and stilled field; seemingly unwilling or incapable of leaving. After nine seasons this was his last the played his last game tonight. As the field lights were fading out one by one, he stood reflecting upon those past seasons - the victories and defeats, the good and bad times, the times it seemed you, could never lose, and the times when nothing went your way. He realized how much the game had become a part of him. He wondered if he could ever say goodbye.

The game had been an excellent teacher to the player. It taught him things that he could never learn in a schoolroom or on a street corner – things like discipline, self-reliance, personal honor, and the feeling of pride in accomplishment. He also learned teamwork and that relying upon someone else was not a sign of weakness, but a sign of trust and strength. He could, count on his teammates on and off the. field, and. they know they could count on him. There was unsaid motto and bond among the players – "Once a Lancer, a teammate and Lancer forever. For as long as other young men wore the blue and white, the player would be there with them.

One of the things that the player learned from the game was that no matter how dark and tough something may look, there was always a reserve strength he could call on deep down inside him that would see him through the difficulty. In a football game the difficulty may be third down and two, but in life the problems would be real and difficult.

The people that the player had the honor of meeting and being teammates with were of the best mold. They were true friends, not shallow opportunists that were always in abundance. Football also taught the player to work hard at all times and to dedicate oneself to a good cause. The player remembered leaving games, seeing students wasting their talents and personal honor by getting sick drinking and acting like fools trying to get the attention of girls in the stands. It did not bother the player because he was not sweating and bleeding for them, but for his teammates. The player also took comfort in thinking that someday when his son asks him what he did in high school, instead of saying, "I used to pass out at football games" he could proudly reply, "With the best guys around, I played football."

As the player stood on the field, memories as real as the present flashed before him – Catholic Central, Notre Dame, Lumen Christi, Bishop Foley. He remembered his first start three years ago – "Three years ago", thought the player, "it seemed just like yesterday that I was a sophomore," and now, images of the De La Salle games flashed before him vividly – the packed stadiums, fierce rivalries, the frustrations. The player wished he could have one more shot at them, but it would never be. He remembered the championship game at the Silverdome, and then recalled his most treasured memory of all – picking up Jim Gorzalski after the clock ran out and we were assured our victory over Brother Rice. The following minutes of mobbing, jumping, yelling, of carrying each other and being carried, were the best memories the player had.

By now all the lights were off, and the filled tam bus was waiting to leave. With one last glance, he looked at the field, the empty bleachers, the blank scoreboard, and the goal posts. He then turned his back and walked away. He had said goodbye in his own way and had left, but a very important part of him would never leave.
